The crisis of capitalism in our times? What is to be done? by Roger Seifert



We are confronted with a huge amount of information from endlessly competing sources -- the amount of real-world real-time data is the same as always, but the speed and accessibility of such facts and opinions and interpretations is new. How do we make sense of it all? From the looming climate catastrophe to war and famine, from the abysmal economic inequalities to war and disease, the four horsemen of the apocalypse ride forth over the world's population. Inequality – of income and opportunity, of health and education, of housing and welfare, and as between genders, ethnicities, abilities, and sexual orientation – that stands out among an increasingly interconnected humankind. This deep inequality creates insecurity, which leads to instability in personal and family life, in communities, regions, nations, and globally. The result is lack of cooperation, inward looking fortresses (Europe, USA, India), and more divisions and fewer answers. Neoliberal-capitalist globalization since the 1970s produced an even rawer and more ruthless type of capitalism and put an end to the struggles of the 20th century, but it also generated a new 21st-century left, that have been impressively creative and radical in form. This talk is an attempt to understand the context of the 21st-century left and its innovative responses to the major challenges of the present conjuncture. What are the prospects for the 21st-century working class and for the struggles of the left?

Roger Seifert is Emeritus professor at Wolverhampton University. He read PPE at Oxford University, then a MBA at London Business School, and a PhD in industrial relations at LSE. He worked as a management consultant in London before joining Keele University. He was professor of industrial relations there from1993-2010 and took the same job at Wolverhampton University from 2010-2019. His main research areas include industrial relations, trade unions, strikes, the political economy of wages, state power, and the public sector.

He has worked for several unions including PCS, UNISON, RMT, FBU, UNITE, NUM, and the Police Federation. He is a regular contributor to the BBC, Sky News, and LBC on strikes, trade unions and the Labour Party.
