Memorialising War

Empire, Power and Historical Framing in British National Memory

War memorials serve as reminders of heroism, sacrifice and an official/acceptable national past. In the case of the UK, militarism and military romanticism, as well as the existence of an *imperialist past (and present)*, determine how memories of war and its dead are made. This paper explores the role of national myths and state-sponsored patriotic narratives in historical framing in how the nation's virtues, triumphs and past moral victories are repeated now. A sanitised national history provides a usable, exclusive heroism, and at the same time establishes which casualties are remembered or memorialised, and which are not.
